The Whispers Progressive Garment is unique to Wearable Art Mandurah. It invites up to six different artists from all over Australia to collaboratively create a garment based on a particular theme.

All cultures and divinity hierarchies have deities or patron saints of textile crafts and artisans. These deities and saints demonstrate the importance of textiles and skilled textile artisans in their communities.

Such a focus on a craft, through a deity or saint, ensures that the traditions and knowledge of a craft maintain continuity and cultural significance.

At the end of this journey the 2019 Wearable Art Whispers artists have brought to life 'Poiesis The Goddess of Wearable Art'.

"Poiesis" is derived from ancient Greek and means "to make".

Xanthorrhea Australis pays homage to the uniqueness of the Australian grass tree. Endemic only to Australia, it is an icon of the Australian bush, a true survivor in a harsh land of drought and bushfires.

Lynn Kennedy Sunflare

Sunflare represents stunning Australian sunsets, celebrates the iconic Australian eucalypt and recognises its extraordinary and ancient history.

Textured landscapes and numerous sun drenched gum blossoms were created, symbolising life and beauty and reminds us of our connection to the land we call home.



Meagan Howe Mourning Birds

Flesh-footed Shearwater, migratory birds that breed in Australian waters.

Autopsied fledglings reveal stomachs full of plastic, mistakenly fed to them by their seafaring parents looking for squid. Too heavy to fly, they die on the pristine beaches of Lord Howe Island.

Mother Earth is mourning.

Broome Time

The artist was inspired after experiencing the 'staircase to the moon' phenomenon in Broome WA. Twice monthly during certain times, the full moon rises over Roebuck Bay creating the illusion of a straight sparkling red and gold staircase leading to a blood moon, a uniquely Australian event.





Annie Williams Gondwana Triumphant

The unique flora of Australia is destroyed yet invigorated by fire and water. My work celebrates the adaptation to fire and triumph of plants evolving over millenia. Heat fused, recycled plastic and reticulation pipe, ubiquitous in our modern landscape, represent the resilient ancient flora that thrives phoenix-like after fire.



Marie Wright and Tarelee Freeman Morte - an Australian

Bunyip Morte is our interpretation

Morte is our interpretation of a great Aboriginal myth that has been passed from one culture to another.

The story behind the bunyip is a cautionary tale: be warned - be very careful around billabongs at night you never know who might be lurking in the water...

Alysn Midgelow-Marsden What Lies Within

The wonder of transformation and change in nature and in life. The mystery of the hidden and unseen are shown in this two part living sculpture. The cocoon-like outer structure veils and protects. Then slowly, magically, opens; revealing a vibrant, beautiful life emerging from within, unsullied and full of promise.



Jacq Chorlton Il Etait Une Fois

Once upon a time many fairy-tales had sinister backgrounds, darkness, violence and gore. Over the years these stories have evolved into the feel good tales that we know and love today. Il Etait Une Fois was inspired by my obsession with vintage children's books and the movement of a turning page.



Deb Hiller I Am So Dizzy

Inspired by the optical illusions I found fascinating as a child, I created my artwork. My intention is to use form and a strong black and white design mimicking and accentuating movement, to show the feeling of spinning until you lose control and balance. Getting dizzy is so much fun.



Chorus/Chene Van der Merwe Melissai (Bees)

The bees' movement from one plant to another reminds us of the interconnectedness of all living things. Manmade and natural materials speak of the relationship between man and the honey bee - highlighting aspects of harmony and disharmony and the wisdom required to protect and preserve the diversity of life.



Ardea Murphy Regeneration

Humans are destroying our planet with plastic. My vision was to symbolise the demise of the grey plastic bag. Like the myth of the phoenix that rebirths itself by fire every 500 years, hopefully by then mankind will have discovered a way to recycle our garbage landfills into useful energy.

The Golden Herald messengers; the awe inspiring power of the sun.



Lyn Blasgund X-ray Vision

Our fascination with what we can't see inside our bodies has inspired me to create a wearable art piece using discarded X-rays.

The X-ray process with its silver deposits on synthetic sheets, allows the viewer to see the intricate shapes of bones and tissue creating an abstract collage.



Monica Goodall Scarlett

Inspired by the character Scarlett O'Hara, from the novel 'Gone With the Wind' by Margaret Mitchell, who makes curtains into a Victorian style dress.

This garment has been made by manipulating old net curtains and re-purposing an old novel to create sculptural form.



Svenja Dame Detritus

Dame Detritus emerged from experimenting with collected materials rather than a specific design concept - a bicycle helmet found in curb side rubbish, lace scraps from a local designer, PET plastic bottles, awning material, vinyl strips, shibori-shaped organza from previously unfinished work, and a fourth re-incarnation of an original pattern.



Antoaneta Tica Icy Willow

Since ancient times, the willow was associated with life-giving water. But as freezing rain, water is destructive causing great damage to trees through the weight of ice that covers them. At the same time, it gives them an unseen beauty. Once again, the willow, symbol of life and rebirth, includes both feelings of sadness and joy.



Seinileva Huakau

Kolukalu

Kolukalu is a representation of the environment we live in now. It speaks about how different generations of the same family have adapted and adopted new materials into the traditional making practices.

By relearning, practising and teaching these techniques we not only keep the tradition of weaving, we learn how to preserve our environment.



Stephanie Munro Just Breathe

My inspiration is anxiety. The reuse of respirators, ironically used to allow one to breathe is juxtaposed against the theme of anxiety and one's inability to catch a breath. White eludes to outward perfection, the greys, insecurity and turmoil. The cage and headpiece show strength but hint at inner vulnerability.

Neroli Makim Art from the Farm

Transforming scrap from the farm into high art. In this artwork, I focussed on ways to use waste materials and repurpose them for creativity. This work is made almost entirely from left over bits and pieces of scrap farming materials that I found in the sheds around the farm. There are only three materials used: polythene pipe, fencing wire and paint.

The outfit represents a malleable armour of sorts; for a Norse warrior looking to change their fate and gain their glory, taking direct inspiration from the actions of the All-father himself.

Stella de Rozario Water Lily Pool

Inspired by Monet's Water Lily series, the use of items discarded by both man and nature organically flow together to make an evolution from canvas to fashion to garden.



Deb Ridley

Rainbow Darkness

Escape, fear, guilt - is the vision you see and emotions you feel as the serpent escapes his crimes.

Inspiration from Dreamtime stories of the rainbow serpent and how he came to be known.

The early Australian culture is fascinating and I would like to raise the awareness and education to all, on the many stories that can be told of early history.

Jacinta McDonald White Lies

White Lies is a visual interpretation of the coral bleaching epidemic currently facing our great ocean reefs. We watch our ocean reef life disintegrate away revealing their skeletal frame. What remains is a vast white moulded landscape incapable of harbouring life.



Nasrin Qasemi Coral

My inspiration was coral, its vibrant colours and unique shapes. Global warming is causing these beautiful coral reefs to bleach and die. By creating this design, I want to give a silent message about global warming and its environmental impact on coral reefs. It is happening to the Great Barrier Reef in Australia.



Julie Mwiragua Bundles

Inspired by the work of artist Shani Crowe, Bundles explores the precision and artistry of braiding. Crowe utilises braids to create elaborate and gravity-defying sculptures from the scalp up. My piece aims to replicate the strong line, direction and rhythm Shani Crowe forms in her work.



April Richards Gaudy Masked Dress

Gaudy Masked Dress is inspired by James Ensor's tragi-comedic themed painting 'Skeletons Fighting Over a Hanged Man' (1891). I have chosen to represent Ensor's menacing and garishly dressed figures with a patchwork opulence of coloured ruffles and fabriccovered bird masks.



Lani Pham Cyber Bullying

Cyber bullying, its shaming messages make people feel insecure and trapped, capable of destroying lives.

The whole design resembled wiring connections, a screen and a computer keyboard. Materials consisted of wadding, tulle, calico and stress fabric. Zero waste construction was used to minimise cost and environmental impact.



Carlia Harris Aural Resonance

This piece was created from the idea of sound, communication and verbal language. Usually body language is a visual way of conveying emotion, thoughts and ideas, so I wanted to turn this visual communication into a type of auditory communication as well.



Grace Drennan Beauty and Grace

Flamingos symbolise beauty and confidence. This avant garde piece symbolises beauty, balance and grace. By creating a layer of different colours, Grace Drennan has created a 3D texture.

Grace Nucifora

The Seventh Star

The style of the outfit resembles ancient warriors. The circular frames consist of life elements needed to survive - water, oxygen and time. The Seventh Star is the centre of the elements and resembles creation. It is the resting place of the warriors and it is their protector.



Teddy McRitchie

"A woman is like a flower, if you care for her and love her enough, you'll have the honour of watching her bloom," Davis Dolezal. The correlation of women to flowers is reflected in my wearable art piece. 427 handmade paper leaves and 226 handmade paper flowers were used in this creation.



Aysha Vale

Aysha

Influenced by late artist Judith Scott, Aysha was provided with a range of materials and over several sittings with support from her sister Ruby (10) she came up with this self-titled creation named Aysha. Over the course of creating, she had included toys, which have now been removed.



Kiana and Tyler Murphy Imagine

This artwork is designed with brilliant colours contrasting with destitute dullness, utilising two works of recycled fabrics adorned with paper flowers, wire and threaded beads. This is then connected by an illuminated rope of bonding to symbolise "acceptance" and us all "living in peace."



Catherine Shepherd Voyage of the Ancestor

Blue oceans crossed, fans symbolising sails and lanterns for stars, depict the journey of Chinese men to the 1890s WA gold rush. Broken china pieces for family and culture left behind, constructed from plastic car bumpers that China will no longer receive as land fill and hand-beaded pearls for riches.



Grace Nucifora Vintage Paper

Vintage Paper resembles an idealistic 1960s woman in the eyes of the public. The design is based on the stereotypes and pressures placed on women. It displays the "required" elegance of women. This piece outlines a specific list of guidelines that a successful woman, wife and mother must uphold.




Azalia Turner

The Process of Self Sabotage

Azalia intended to capture her current paradigm and aspects of her childhood psyche, as a wearable, artistic record of her personal history.

In addition Aly is known in the industry as a mentor and support for WA fashion designers providing advice on business development.

Gillian Kaye Peebles is a highly respected multi-talented artist whose successful career has taken her all over the world.



She combined these disciplines with those of Wearable Art resulting in her numerous contributions to Wearable Art Mandurah. She introduced and continues to support, the Youth section of Wearable Art.

Carolyn Chard

Carolyn Chard is Executive Director, West Australian Opera and has worked in senior roles in theatre, festivals and opera including leadership roles with Deckchair Theatre 1992-1994, Barking Gecko Theatre 1995-1999, Awesome Festival 1995-1999, Black Swan Theatre secondment 2000; West Australian Opera 2001-2005; Opera Australia (Sydney and Melbourne) 2005-2009 and West Australian Opera 2009-present.

In 2004 she was awarded a fellowship to attend the Executive Program for Non Profit Leaders (Arts) at Stanford University, California and in 2014 was awarded a place in McKinsey's inaugural 'Remarkable Women Program'. Tertiary

This prize provides an opportunity for emerging designers to showcase their fresh ideas, enthusiasm and talent.

Youth

Bold – playful – serious – sophisticated. The Youth prize celebrates divergent ideas and the emerging talent of our 18 years and under.

Migration

Mandurah's wetlands are known as a haven for intercontinental migratory birds, just as our city is home to people from across the globe.

Explore the flow and flux of travelling populations, both human and wild.

Black & White

Strip your garment back to the essentials of form, texture and technique in the monochrome.

The Creative Reuse Award is an overarching award, encompassing all five categories. It encourages the reuse of discarded objects or materials to create a product of higher quality or value than the original. A minimum of 80% repurposed materials is required.
